The Dysart woman using the methods of the far East for better well-being

Complementary therapist

A DYSART woman is offering people a new approach to healing, including a technique that helped China to Olympic glory.

From her own private studio at home, Mariette Lobo offers a wide range of treatments taking influence from her Indian roots and further east. Her long-term aim is to see complementary and traditional therapies integrated within mainstream healthcare, making them more accessible to all. The part-time lecturer at Adam Smith College explained why she started offering the service and how this method of care was normal in her upbringing. Mariette said: "I started this 15 years ago. I worked for the BBC at the time and I was going to my GP for stress. My GP told me to either take tablets or try massage. "I thought I could do it better myself and I have never looked back. "Also, it's part of my culture and upbringing.



"For my family that was the first port of call when they weren't well. "And although it's complementary to traditional medicines, it probably doesn't have the side effects of them." Registered with the only recognised body for her field, the CNHC, Mariette specialises in Reflexology, Tuina, Aromatherapy, Indian Head Massage, Warm Bamboo Massage and Reiki. Tuina ("twee-na") is one of the ancient healing arts of traditional Chinese medicine and treats conditions that in the West would require an osteopath, chiropractor, physiotherapist or sports therapist.

This procedure helped China to the medal table at both the Paralympics and Olympics in London this year. Mariette said of her healing methods: "It's different. It's good for stress relief, relaxation and it just gives you a general feeling of health and well-being. "I don't see it as an alternative to traditional medicine, I see it as complementary. I don't have a favourite treatment, but I think that one of the most sought after ones is Tuina. "It's very relaxed and it's different, not a sensory massage, but a medical massage - a very traditional Chinese massage."



Tuina dream: IF you want someone with a gnarled back to work on as a case study, then I'm your man. Two years ago I had a slipped disc - not just any old slipped disc, but one that did a 360-degree spin which left me screaming in such pain my neighbours kindly popped up to check I wasn't being murdered. Build your own ...

Mark said: "I will be training everyone on creating a site from scratch, and by the end of the day everyone will have installed and customised their WordPress website, and been shown how to add content to the site; including text, images and videos. "We can also integrate social media into the sites as well as contact forms. This will not only provide those attending and their businesses, charities and social enterprises with an online presence, but everyone will also gain the knowledge to be able to keep their sites updated and fresh." The majority of web designers will not only charge for creating a site, but would also charge their clients for training them on how to update the site, often running into hundreds of pounds, if not thousands. WordPress has been around since 2003, and is used by over 60 million sites worldwide. The platform is supported by thousands of developers, programmers and designers, providing support and updates, making it the ideal platform for today's small business or charity. For anyone wanting to attend the workshop, the first priority is to book a place, as space is very limited to

ensure everyone's questions can get answered on the day. To book simply go to www.macgraphic.co.uk. Teas, coffees and lunch vouchers will be provided on the day, at no extra cost. Anyone attending will need to take with them a wi-fi enabled laptop, with the content (text and images) all ready to go on to their sites. "This will not be a talk were I tell you how to create a site, and you head off in the hope of remembering everything. Everyone will be building their site live on the day." The cost of the one-day workshop is £72.50, and includes a co.uk domain name if required, and the first month's

hosting with www.your-host.co.uk on their startup package at £2.49 per month. It is essential everyone provides Mark the details of the domain name they want to register before October 1, as it can take a couple of days for domain names to get set up.

Law firm to move for expansion

PERSONAL injury law specialist Digby Brown is preparing to move from its Glenrothes premises to Kirkcaldy. The Glenrothes branch of the national firm was set up in 2002 by partner Innes Laing, but over the years it has expanded and the current premises are now too small to accommodate the seven staff. Mr Laing explained: "The premises aren't big enough for us now, and we had to make the decision whether to look for larger offices in Glenrothes or move to Kirkcaldy. "Because quite a bit of the work we do is court work, we decided it would make sense for us to move to Kirkcaldy to be nearer the Sheriff Court, and that is what we are doing." Digby Brown will move to its new premises at 23 Whytescauseway on October 2, and Mr Laing says it is a move they are all looking forward to.
